



The Cornish Rattle

I had no idea that this stalky flower was a parasite. Farmers hate(d) it because it feeds on the roots of grass; this weakens the plant and diminishes the hay crop. The Yellow Rattle. Here it is:



Most wild flowers do well in soil which has never seen a bag of fertiliser – either natural or from a factory – so there is plenty of yellow rattle on uncultivated land. You find it in the meadows in Millook valley and on the way up to Cancleave from Trebarfoote Combe.

I am a gardener, so this is what I want for the couch grass. This would save mowing and give me pretty flowers with a bonus of a seed capsule which rattles in the wind. (I'm easily pleased.) When I last walked in the meadows at Millook, I did notice a definite lessening of the grass around the Yellow Rattle.

It used to be called Coxcomb. If you use an ounce of imagination and a full glass of wine, and look at the flower, you will see it looks like a cockerel's head:



I cannot stress enough the importance of the glass of wine.



There *is* a cultivated flower called the Cockscomb. It looks like this: It too needs a little wine to ease the brain.

The recent realisation that we have destroyed most of our wild flower meadows has given Yellow Rattle a sudden and unexpected burst of popularity. Loads of people want wild flowers in their gardens, and Yellow Rattle helps to reduce the grass and create the right space for wild flowers. I see you can buy Rattle seeds on the internet. This is excellent news. Can we all have a go at setting aside a bit of our gardens to go wild?

Things have changed – and for the better

Churches are required to have a quinquennial inspection, when their buildings are inspected and work needed is pinpointed. St Winwaloe's most recent report described the church as being well cared for and in a good state. However, not so long ago things were rather different ... the report of July 1970 commented:

Ivy [is] growing in such abundance as to have already obscured one window and nearly obscured the north door and adjacent large buttress ... Externally the tower is in fair condition ... [but] the interior presents a scene of the utmost neglect. The turret stairs were impassible, being completely blocked with sticks and other debris brought in by jackdaws, a distinct fire hazard ... The belfry itself was also littered with sticks and the floor again needs cleaning and examining properly. There is a hole in the centre indicating rotting boards ... in the west parapet a large elderberry bush is flourishing, and on the opposite side a blackberry is also growing. The centre gutter is choked with grass, chickweed and hay, and the lead gargoyle is bent and torn. All this growth must be removed or water is bound to get into the roof timbers and the masonry split open by the plant roots. The flagstaff is beyond painting ... a new door and frame is required to the stair turret.

[Heating] is by a large tortoise stove at the west end, the flue ... is now rusty ... and in a dangerous condition, liable to fall at any time ... There is [no lightning conductor] ... the west gate is falling to pieces ... the churchyard badly needs cutting and the paths clearing ...

Oh dear! Happily the church is now in good heart, thanks to a great deal of dedication and hard work from churchwardens and congregations over the last fifty years. Still, it just goes to show that we must never cease to care for our ancient buildings if we want them to survive to serve the people of Poundstock.

Our Night Sky in August 2020

Jupiter followed by Saturn will be visible as soon as it is dark, and will dominate the southern sky throughout the night. Mars will be following, rising about 2300 and again visible throughout the night, its red colour obvious as it approaches its closest point to Earth. Venus will greet early risers at about 0300 in the morning, rising as a brilliant 'Morning Star' in the north east and remaining a brilliant object until dawn.

I wonder how many of you were fortunate enough to see Comet Neowise which appeared last month. The comet cruised just inside Mercury's orbit on 3 July. This very close passage by the Sun cooked the comet's outermost layers, causing gas and dust to erupt off the icy surface and creating a large tail of debris. Comets are unpredictable objects, sometimes producing magnificent tails and sometimes just a disappointing blob in the sky. This happened to the last appearance of the famous Halley's comet, which, when it appeared in the early twentieth century, sported the finest tail seen for many years. However, on its much-heralded return seventy years later it could hardly be seen at all, having exhausted all its ice on its previous encounter with the Sun.

Comets are cosmic snowballs of frozen gases, rock and dust that orbit the Sun. When frozen, they are the size of a small town. When a comet's orbit brings it close to the Sun, it heats up and spews dust and gases into a giant glowing head larger than most planets. Most originate in the Oort Cloud, which is the most distant region of our solar system. Even the nearest objects in the Oort Cloud are thought to be many times farther from the Sun than the outer reaches of the Kuiper Belt.

Unlike the orbits of the planets and the Kuiper Belt, which lie mostly in the same flat disc around the Sun, the Oort Cloud is believed to be a giant spherical shell surrounding the rest of the solar system. It is like a big, thick-walled bubble made of icy pieces of space debris each the size of mountains. Because the orbits of long-period comets are so extremely long, scientists suspect that the Oort Cloud is the source of most of those comets. Comets are occasionally diverted into the inner Solar System by a gravitational tug from one of the outer planets, and it is one of these that has not been round the Sun before that can produce a fine tail if it has plenty of ice from its birth. Comets are important since they consist of pristine material formed at the time of the birth of the Solar System 4.5 billion years ago and, because they are so distant from the Sun, they have not been affected by its radiation.

Comet 67P/Churyumov-Gerasimenko made history as the first comet to be orbited and landed upon by robots from Earth. The Rosetta spacecraft, carrying the Philae lander, rendezvoused with this comet in August 2014 and escorted it on its journey to the inner Solar System and back out again. The comet's nucleus is thought to be quite porous, giving it a density much lower than that of water. When heated by the Sun, it is thought to emit about twice as much dust as gas.

When a comet transits the orbit of Earth round the Sun, it leaves a cloud of debris through which the Earth travels each year. This cloud of debris provides the meteors and meteorites that flash across the sky at regular times of the year, and August is famous for the appearance of the Perseids between 11 and 13 August. Well worth lying out on a sun bed, wrapping up well and gazing up at the sky to see these brilliant leftovers of a comet that passed through Earth's orbit long ago.

A Poundstock mystery?

From time to time the Packet is asked for help by people whose family history includes this area. Recently we received this, from Mr Geoff Betton:

Maria Bray was baptised at Poundstock 10th August 1788.

In a Will proven 5th July 1810, Maria was left an annuity by Captain John Betton, 3rd Dragoon Guards, of Abbey Foregate, Shrewsbury.

In 1810 Maria Bray married George Tom, a Seaman.

Captain John Betton died at Merida, Spain, of fever, 20th November 1809.

Why did John Betton leave the annuity to Maria Bray?

Can anyone in Poundstock answer this question please?

It's the stuff of historical novels: why would a young man from Shrewsbury leave an annuity to a girl from a rural Cornish parish? The Bettons were a notable Shrewsbury family. Shrewsbury Abbey has a memorial plaque to them, and a Nathaniel Betton, almost certainly John's father, was mayor of Shrewsbury in 1798. John joined the militia during the Napoleonic wars and died of fever in Spain at the age of 31. The Brays, of course, were (and still are) a Cornish farming family.

So what was the connection between a young military captain and a Cornish maid? Maybe someone has a family story that can shed light on the mystery. It would be fascinating to know.

Jacobstow WI



Property Update

Lockdown has caused some enormous problems in the housing market. Now that the government has tried to lift the shackles and get us back to a relatively normal way of life, the Chancellor has stepped in to offer government assistance to kick-start house sales.

The main incentive is the stamp duty holiday which he has announced. This has seen an increase in demand of 49 per cent for homes between £400,000 and £500,000 – just under the threshold at which stamp duty now applies. There was also an increase of 26 per cent for homes priced at £300,000–£400,000, but homes below £300,000 have seen the smallest rise in enquiries.

Against that, more than £30,000 could be wiped off the value of a typical home as the pandemic hits the property market. The office for budget responsibility said prices could fall 2.4 per cent this year and 11.7 per cent next year. This would push the average price of a house down from £230,000 to below £200,000.

With the staycation boom and tax breaks, rural estate agents have reported a threefold increase in enquiries into holiday homes. Data for *Money Mail* from cottages.com shows that queries from investors wanting to buy holiday lets are already 25 per cent up since the stamp duty holiday was announced. Visits to its Let Your Property pages have increased by 180 per cent. Meanwhile, bookings for holiday homes between July 1 and August 31 are already up 156 per cent on last year. And in East Devon and St Ives, bookings are up by 263 per cent and 262 per cent respectively.

The government has frequently indicated the need to provide many more new homes. It has now looked at the land which it owns itself. A study commissioned for the Ministry of Housing has found that selling 15 per cent of government-owned car parking space could raise £6 billion and free land for 110,000 new homes. Many car parks close to town centres, shops and railway stations could be developed into desirable places to live.

Many of us query whether the future of the office is now under threat following the huge change in working practices begun with lockdown. A survey, however, of 3,000 office workers shows that 58 per cent of them missed office life. There are many occupiers of office space who apparently intend to retain the space to accommodate office redesign strategies. Other companies, however, have found that their employees work just as hard at home and expect to continue to allow home working. If that does catch on significantly then we can expect some of the bigger companies to watch their balance sheet and use less office space. It will be interesting to see how this plays out.

Parish Council Chairman's Report

The issue of parking has been ongoing for some time, and following extensive local consultation on two proposals the cheaper option was chosen in the light of comments made. However, once the work started it was clear from the reaction that it was not meeting with general approval. The project was paused for further consultation and, after discussion, the Parish Council agreed go ahead for this summer season, and for a full review to be carried out in the autumn. This will take into account any problems to determine which sections need changing / extending /removing, and to evaluate the positive outcomes. Please pass on your comments in writing to the Clerk, Lynn Pluess.



Concerns have also been raised over the present restriction of access to Wanson Mouth beach, which has been open for the public for a considerable number of years. If you have photos of past activity at Wanson, could you please pass these on to the Clerk, as we are anxious to establish the historic precedence.

The Parish Council has 'met' twice for virtual meetings on Zoom, and once for a dedicated planning session since lockdown. Despite a minor technical issue these have been productive and business was conducted smoothly. It has not been ideal, but could possibly be used for future ad hoc Council meetings.

A virtual meeting of the Bude Community Network, involving six neighbouring parishes, was very informative about the different ways each parish has been dealing with the emergency, and it became obvious that those with a central focal point for activities had the stronger community spirit and cooperation. It is my hope that we shall be able to move forward sooner rather than later with plans for a replacement Community Hall, and be able to bring together the whole parish.

Excerpts from the draft minutes of the PPC meeting, 20 June 2020 (contd from p. 21)

Cornwall Councillor's report: Nicky Chopak reported Cornwall Council's budget is £32 million into its reserve, meaning there will be cuts in front-line services. It is uncertain when money will be received back from government. Covid-19 figures are very low for the area and we want to keep it that way.

Cornwall Council is currently providing and paying for PPE equipment in the care homes. She has not heard of any issues in Poundstock, specifically with vunerable people struggling with isolation, shopping, etc., and urged everyone continue to keep a watchful eye. Cornwall Council elections are due to be held in 2021 although there is a debate on whether elections will be deferred. There is a new GoCornwall bus service travelling, timetable is available online [see transportforcornwall.co.uk/timetables].

A large quantity of sand has been removed from Widemouth Bay, Cornwall Council is aware and investigating further. In the car park the wording prohibiting overnight parking has been moved into a more prominent central position on the sign. Information signs for dogs on beaches are to be made larger. She has been informed that legislation does not allow AMPR cameras on Council-owned car parks, only permitted on those privately owned.

Chairman's report [and see above]: The toilets at Widemouth were finally opened two weeks later than hoped; he conveyed gratitude to Laura and Tom for making sure that they meet the regulations for public health and safety during the Covid-19 crisis. Work on the A39 speed restrictions at Bangors and the parking restrictions in Widemouth should be starting soon as the siting for the new signs has already been marked out. The Parish has been asked to make a contribution as the parking restriction project came out over budget, amount not yet determined. After a wobbly start the virtual planning meeting proved to be a success, and we should consider making this a regular practice. The mid-month slot would enable responses to planning applications within the Cornwall Council time frame without having to ask for extensions or call extraordinary meetings. The virtual Bude Area Network meeting held earlier this month gave an opportunity to catch up with safeguarding measures in neighbouring parishes and highlighted the need to firm up the Emergency Procedures Plan; he asked for somebody to consider taking on this responsibility. Finally he thanked everyone who has worked so hard to keep the beaches, toilets, footpaths and open spaces clean and safe. He emphasised the need to stay alert coming out of lockdown to ensure that all the rules and guidelines are followed so that we can all continue to enjoy the wider freedom we have in our surroundings.

Excerpts from the draft minutes of the virtual meeting of Poundstock Parish Council, 30 June 2020

An Ordinary Meeting of Poundstock Parish Council was held via Zoom, starting at 7.30 pm.


