Is there money or arm twisting involved for this to happen? The whole idea is ludicrous. This area is not the place for this to be built. The sensible place would be in a triangle between Holsworthy, Launceston and Okehampton. That would cover a very large area covering a large population where people have to travel a big distance for Barnstaple or Bodmin.

Who thinks that their idea of a day out would be to go to Widemouth/ Poundstock, they've got a crematorium there?

I am fed up with these U-turns, starting at the bottom with local government to the top at Westminster. They are not supporting the wishes of the majority.

Committee hearing news

According to the website Stopthecrematorium.org, the application was originally pencilled in to be heard on 16 June 2022. At the last minute it was then pulled in favour of a Technical Briefing on 21 July with the Hearing to be held on 11 August. However, it was then announced at the Technical Briefing that it was not definitely going to be heard on 11 August, finally being listed to be heard on 15 September.

However, Cornwall Council issued this statement on 13 September::

It has been decided to defer planning application PA21/01480 from the forthcoming Agenda of the Strategic Planning Committee to be held on 15 September 2022 due to the sensitivities surrounding the specific nature of the proposed development and the sad passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. The application will instead proceed to be targeted towards the next meeting of the Strategic Planning Committee on 13 October 2022.

Stop the Crematorium.org said: 'Residents and Parish Councillors are extremely disappointed and concerned as to how this application is being managed by Cornwall Council. It is obviously hoped that the "targeted" date of 13 October for the hearing does indeed proceed.'

Someone once asked me. "What is the nearest star to Earth?

I answered with smug satisfaction. 'Alpha Proxima Centauri'. I added the *Proxima* bit just to show off.

And they said, 'WRONG! The answer is the sun.'

And, of course, they were right ,and I felt about *so* high.



The sun is the cause of everything – I mean *everything* ... every single event – big or small – on earth. Even the meteorite which destroyed the dinosaurs was attracted into our solar system by the sun.

The sun gives light which grows plants which we eat – directly or indirectly. The light is caused by the sun doing weird things to hydrogen. It manages to join two atoms of

hydrogen. The result is helium and a tiny pulse of light. The light travels really fast, and some comes to Earth where the plants soak it up and grow.

The Ancient Greeks called the sun Helios. Helios was a god who drove his golden chariot across the sky during the day. He gives his name to lots of plants: *Helianthus* is the glorious sunflower: *Heliotrope* turns its head towards the sun.

And, of course, *helium*, which is not a flower.

Hundreds of years ago, Copernicus – an astronomer – worked out that the sun was the centre of the solar system. He called the system *heliocentric*. Galileo went on to strengthen Copernicus' heliocentric system, but the Church refused to

accept his idea. The Church made him recant, but this did not really stop the new belief from becoming accepted: the sun *is* the centre of the solar system.

Sol is the Latin for the sun. It gives us *solstice* when the sun reaches its highest point (June 21st) and lowest (December 21st); it gives us *solarium*, a sun room; and *parasol*; and, of course, *solar*.

We have passed the summer solstice now and await, perhaps sadly, the winter solstice.

Garden Diary

I've had some disappointing results with the vegetable garden this year, including several batches of runner beans refusing to germinate, but some successes with indoor plants—geraniums, orchids and citrus. With their vibrant flowers and fragrant foliage, pelargoniums are long-standing favourites, both indoors and out. Grown outside as bedding plants, they are

often thrown away at the end of the season, but they are true perennials and with care can last years. I used to lift them each year and wrap the roots in damp newspaper, stored somewhere dry and dark, but I now grow deep blood red zonal pelargoniums (which we like to call geraniums) all year round in my conservatory. They get a lot of attention in spring when I generally get them ready for the coming season by feeding and repotting, and again in the autumn when they get a general tidy up, removing dead leaves and flower stems. Like all Mediterranean plants they'll survive



drought with ease, but not frost, so if you grow them outdoors bring them indoors before temperatures drop. I'm not exactly brilliant at helping houseplants survive, but geraniums are such an easy, undemanding plant to grow. I take cuttings in spring or autumn, just poking three or four healthy green shoots into a 3" pot and they'll be rooted within a month.

A couple of years ago I bought a lemon tree. I knew I'd have to keep it in the conservatory except for a few months in mid-summer, and I knew I had to be careful about watering and feeding it. The instructions were to try to imitate conditions in southern Europe where rainfall is often sparse – so I let the little tree dry out completely. Then, trying to emulate the occasional summer storm, I drenched it. Within a week all the leaves and baby lemons



fell off in shock and I feared I'd killed it. Luckily the lemon tree and I have now developed a much more understanding relationship – despite the advice, I now do not let it dry out completely and have never tried to drown it again. It gets a weak citrus feed every week and just enough of a drink to stop it being thirsty. And when I counted yesterday, it was bearing nine baby lemons. Gin and tonic anyone? The slice of lemon is part of your five-a-day.

Our Night Sky in October

Jupiter and Saturn will be rising in the east as soon as the sun sets, while Mars will follow much later at about 10pm. All three will be prominent throughout the night, and will be joined by Taurus and Orion after midnight. Welcome to the winter constellations!

The USA is going back to the Moon for scientific discovery, economic benefits and inspiration for a new generation of explorers: the Artemis Generation, aiming to build a global alliance and explore deep space for the benefit of all. Artemis I, formerly Exploration Mission-1, will be the first integrated flight test of NASA's Deep Space Exploration Systems: the Orion spacecraft, Space Launch System (SLS) rocket, with the newly upgraded Exploration Ground Systems at Kennedy Space Center in Cape Canaveral, Florida.

The primary goal of the mission is to assure a safe crew module entry, descent, splashdown and recovery. Besides sending Orion around the Moon, SLS will carry ten small satellites that will perform their own science and technology investigations. The first in a series of increasingly complex missions, Artemis I will provide a foundation for human deep space exploration and demonstrate our commitment and capability to extend human existence to the Moon and beyond prior to the first flight with crew on Artemis II. The spacecraft will launch on the most powerful rocket in the world and fly farther than any spacecraft built for humans. It will travel 280,000 miles from Earth, far beyond the Moon, over a four- to six-week mission, staying in space longer than any ship for astronauts has done without docking to a space station and returning home faster and hotter than ever before.

If it is successful, Artemis II will take a different trajectory and test Orion's critical systems with humans aboard. The SLS rocket will evolve from a capability of sending more than 26 metric tons to the Moon, to one of at least 45 metric tons. Orion, SLS and the Kennedy ground systems will be able to meet the most challenging crew and cargo mission needs in deep space. Future exploration missions with crew aboard Orion will assemble and dock

with a gateway, which will be used for deep-space operations including missions to and on the Moon with decreasing reliance on the Earth, extending human exploration farther into the solar system than ever before.

I will keep you informed about this exciting mission to eventually set up a moon base at the Moon's South Pole. Bill Turnill

Bill wrote this before the first attempts to launch Artemis 1, which had to be called off for technical reasons. Hopefully, later attempts will be successful.

We Will Remember Them: hmcs Regina

Every year, on Remembrance Sunday, a small ceremony takes place at the Canadian graves in Poundstock Churchyard, commemorating the bravery of the crew of HMCS *Regina*. Many parishioners will have heard of the graves, but do you know the story behind them?



The *Regina* was a Canadian corvette (a small warship), built in 1941 to escort the convoys of ships struggling to avoid mines, U-boats and air attack. In March 1944, after distinguished service off North Africa, she joined the England and Western Approaches Command in the build-up to D-Day. In early August 1944, she was the sole escort

to a convoy of ten ships in the Bristol Channel, clearing mines ahead of them in a zig-zag pattern. At about 21.30, eight miles from Trevose Head, there was an explosion and a mayday message: one of the ships in the convoy, the USS *Ezra Weston*, perhaps straying outside the cleared area, reported that she had hit a mine. Together with another ship from the convoy, HM LCT *644*, the *Regina* hastened to the scene. The *Ezra Weston* was clearly in a bad way and within an hour the crew had been safely transferred to the LCT. Meanwhile it was decided to tow the *Ezra Weston* into shallower water. Ropes were attached and the LCT had just begun to take the strain when, at 22.48, there was another explosion: the *Regina* had suffered a catastrophic blast. She reared up and in less than half a minute she sank, stem first. Of her crew, 66 were saved but 30 were lost. It is thought that only five bodies were ever found, of whom three, washed up on the North Cornish coast, rest in Poundstock churchyard: Able Seaman Thomas Malone (22), Stoker Alfred Dawson (32) and Stoker William Cramp (42).

It was only some years later, when German war records became available, that the real reason for the sinking emerged. It was not a mine at all: the *Regina* had been torpedoed by U-boat *U-667*. Had this been realised at the time, the *Regina*'s master would have acted very differently.

The wrecks of the *Regina* and the *Ezra Weston* lie in about 200ft of water north of Trevose Head. *U-667* struck a mine and sank in the Bay of Biscay less than three weeks after the attack on the convoy; all her crew were lost. So many losses, so much sadness: we must never forget the horrors of war.
